

Who is ALICE in State House District 102?

United Way of Pennsylvania launched a statewide data project, The ALICE Report, which provides a comprehensive measure of financial hardship across our state.

ALICE stands for Asset Limited, Income Constrained, Employed.

ALICE households work each day and earn more than the Federal Poverty Level, but struggle to meet a conservative household budget in relation to the basic cost of living for the district.



ALICE Struggling in House District 102

Combined, the number of ALICE and poverty-level households equals the total population of our community struggling to afford basic needs. The Federal Poverty Level is no longer a realistic measure of financial hardship in this country and has not been updated since 1974 to take into account the rising costs of living.

ALICE households are working households. They hold jobs, pay taxes, and provide services that are vital to the Pennsylvania economy, in a variety of positions, such as retail salespeople, laborers and movers, customer service representatives, teachers and office workers.

ALICE Workers primarily hold jobs in occupations that build and repair our infrastructure and educate and care for the workforce.

Survival Vs. Stability Budget of Lebanon County

The Household Survival Budget reflects the bare minimum that a household needs to live and work today. It does not include savings for emergencies or future goals like college. In 2018, costs were well above the Federal Poverty Level of \$12,140 for a single adult and \$25,100 for a family of four. Family of four costs increased by 39 percent statewide from 2010 to 2018, compared to 15 percent inflation nationally.

The Household Stability Budget

measures how much income is needed to support and sustain an economically viable household, including both a 10% savings plan and the cost of employer-sponsored health insurance. A moderate increase in quality of life that includes safer and reliable housing, reliable transportation, and reasonable luxuries such as in home internet and one meal out per month.

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
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

Who is ALICE in State House District 102?

ALICE stands for Asset Limited, Income Constrained, Employed. United Way of PA's ALICE report provides a comprehensive measure of financial hardship for working families across PA. ALICE households work each day and earn more than the Federal Poverty Level, but struggle to meet a conservative household budget. In Pennsylvania, 35% of families with children are ALICE.





Child care for a family with two children is a family's greatest expense and accounts for 21% of a household survival budget, which is well above the affordability threshold established by the U.S. Department of Health and Human Services.

Increasing access to affordable, publiclyfunded, high quality child care and pre-k is essential for Pennsylvania's hard-working ALICE families and their journey to achieve financial stability.
